## Introduction

The Islam and Muslims Initiative, in collaboration with the University of Sarajevo, Hamad Bin Khalifa University, the Center for Advanced Studies in Sarajevo, and QatarDebate Center, are pleased to announce the international conference “**Beyond East and West: Eurasian Encounters Reimagined**”, to be held in Sarajevo on 9–10 July 2026.

The conference aims to provide an interdisciplinary platform for critically examining historical and contemporary encounters that have shaped interactions between Asia and Europe, and the ways in which religion, culture, and academic knowledge continue to inform understandings of identity, belonging, and coexistence. It encourages historically grounded and intellectually rigorous conversations that are also attentive to future challenges—conversations that not only reassess the past but also open new possibilities for navigating cultural and religious diversity in an increasingly interconnected yet fragmented world. The conference brings together scholars, public intellectuals, journalists, policymakers, religious leaders, and university students.

## About the Theme

The relationship between Asia and Europe has long played a formative role in shaping understandings of identity, religion, civilization, and knowledge. Yet this relationship has often been framed through binaries such as East and West, tradition and modernity, or religion and secularism—frameworks that tend to obscure the complexity of historical encounters and contemporary realities. As political, cultural, and intellectual exchanges continue to reshape the global landscape, there is a growing need to critically reexamine these assumptions and the categories through which they are expressed.

This conference explores Eurasia as a space of interaction rather than division, foregrounding its long history of movement, exchange, coexistence, and intellectual cross-fertilization. Within this perspective, religion is approached not merely as a domain of belief, but as a central lens through which Eurasian encounters have been historically mediated and through which identities continue to be negotiated in the present.

Particular attention is given to the role of Orientalism and related epistemological frameworks in shaping—and at times constraining—interpretations of the “East” and the “West.” The conference examines how these categories have been constructed, contested, and reimagined across different historical and geographical contexts, as well as how they continue to inform contemporary academic, political, and cultural discourses.

Through this lens, participants are invited to engage questions of identity, memory, postcoloniality, religion, and knowledge production in a world marked by both deep interconnection and persistent fragmentation. By moving beyond rigid geographical and conceptual binaries, the symposium seeks to foster a more nuanced understanding of how historical encounters continue to shape present realities and future possibilities.

At the same time, the conference creates space for rethinking how individuals and societies understand themselves in relation to others, opening pathways toward more plural, dialogical, and mutually enriching forms of engagement across cultural, religious, and civilizational boundaries. By doing so, it aspires to contribute to more inclusive and critically informed approaches to the challenges and opportunities of an increasingly complex global future.

Hosted in Sarajevo—a city shaped by centuries of interaction among diverse religious, cultural, and political traditions—the conference also draws symbolic and analytical inspiration from a context that embodies both the possibilities and tensions of coexistence across historical and civilizational intersections.

Their histories move beyond the assumption that encounters occurred only at the immediate borders between Europe and Asia; revealing a wider web of connections, dependencies, exchanges, and forms of resistance that extended across the continent.

Bringing together scholars and public leaders from Southeast and Central Asia, this session explores how postcolonial experiences and emerging Global South studies are contributing to knowledge production from within Eurasia.
